- Acute tension-type headache (often described as “band-like” pain around the head).

3.2 Special Populations

- Elderly (≥ 65 years) – Start with ½ tablet and monitor for sedation or confusion.
 - Patients with hepatic impairment – Limit acetaminophen to ≤ 2 g per day; consider alternative analgesics.
