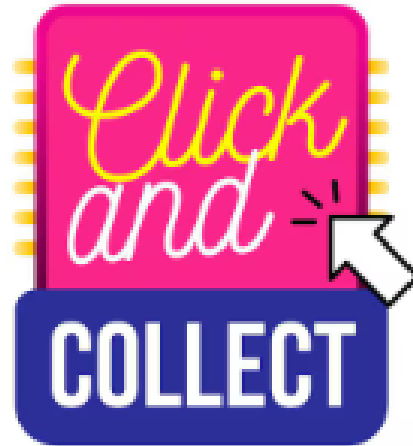

Mechanism of Action

This pharmacologic action underlies its anxiolytic (anti-anxiety), sedative, and muscle-relaxant properties.

Primary Purpose

The drug is indicated to relieve symptoms of anxiety disorders, including generalized anxiety disorder (GAD) and panic disorder. It may also be employed short-term for acute stress reactions under a physician’s supervision.

2. Medical Uses of Alprazolam 2 mg

Generalized Anxiety Disorder (GAD)	Reduces excessive worry, tension, and restlessness	Symptom control enabling daily functioning
Panic Disorder	Diminishes frequency and severity of panic attacks	Prevent recurrence and improve quality of life
Adjunct for Acute Stress	Short-term calming during a crisis (e.g., after trauma)	Immediate relief while longer-term therapy is arranged

3. Dosage Guidance & Administration

General Adult Dosing (Immediate-Release Tablets)

Panic Disorder	0.5 mg taken three times daily	1 mg–4 mg per day	4 mg per day
Acute Stress (short-term)	0.25 mg–0.5 mg as needed (max 2 mg in 24 h)	—	—

Using a 2 mg Tablet

- When prescribed: A 2 mg tablet is usually divided or taken as a single dose for patients who have been titrated to that strength.
- Splitting: Not all tablets are score-line; if splitting is required, confirm with the pharmacist that the tablet can be safely divided.

Administration Tips

- Take with or without food; consistency helps maintain stable blood levels.
- Swallow whole; do not crush unless a liquid formulation is specifically prescribed.
- For patients with liver impairment, dosage may need reduction and extended monitoring.

Special Populations

Population	Recommended Adjustments

Elderly (≥ 65 yr)	Start low (0.25 mg) and titrate slowly; monitor for sedation and falls
Hepatic impairment	Reduce dose by 25-50 %; consider longer dosing intervals
Pregnancy & lactation	Generally contraindicated due to fetal risk; discuss alternatives with OB-GYN

4. Risks, Side Effects, and Dependency

Common Side Effects (≥ 5 % incidence)

- Drowsiness or fatigue
- Light-headedness or dizziness
- Impaired coordination
- Memory disturbances (short-term)
- Mood swings (irritability, agitation)

Less Common but Serious Adverse Events

- Respiratory depression (especially with opioids or alcohol)
- Severe allergic reactions (rash, swelling, anaphylaxis)
- Paradoxical reactions (increased anxiety, aggression)
- Withdrawal seizures when discontinued abruptly after high-dose or long-term use

Dependency & Abuse Potential
